For option 2, a Jordanian visa is included in the total cost if you arrive in Amman with the LLUC group.

ITINERARY

LEBANON (Options 1 and 3)		
Monday, June 16	We leave the US and fly to Beirut, Lebanon.	
Tuesday, June 17	Evening arrival at Beirut, Lebanon.	Overnight Beirut— Boutique Hotel
Wednesday, June 18	We begin our tour of Lebanon by visiting the most famous place, the Forest of the Cedars of the Lord , the most highly prized building materials of the ancient world. Two trees are claimed to be over 3,000 years old and 10 over 1,000 years. The trees can attain a height of 100 feet and the trunk may reach 6 feet in diameter. The Phoenicians used it for boat construction. This aromatic and durable wood was used by King David to build his palace (2 Sam 5:11; 1 Chr 17:1), and King Solomon used it in the construction of the temple and a palace for himself (1 Kings 5:13,14; 2 Chr 2:3-8). On our way we will pass by Bsharri and visit Gibran Museum that houses 440 original paintings and drawings of Gibran and also his tomb. Gibran was an artist, writer and philosopher.	Lunch at the Cedars & Overnight— Beirut—Boutique Hotel
Thursday, June 19	Today we will visit Baalbek which derives its name from the Phoenician sun-god Baal. Jupiter, the sky god and the most important deity of the Romans, presides over Baalbek and has the largest and one of architectures greatest achievements. The other 2 temples are Venus (the goddess of love) and Bacchus (the god of fertility and cheer)). In the Seleucid (323-64 BC) and Roman (64 BC-312 AD) periods, Baalbek became known as Heliopolis (City of the Sun). In the Bible, Baalbek is referred to as Baalath and having been fortified by King Solomon (1 Kings 9:18 and 2 Chr 8:6). In the limestone quarry near the Baalbek temple complex is found the largest stone building block in the world. It is called Hajjar el Hubla (the stone of the pregnant women). It is estimated to weigh 1,200 tons and measures 69 feet long, 16 feet wide and 13 feet 10 inches high. On the way to Baalbek, the religious center of the Bekaa Valley, we will visit Anjar , the political center of that era. It is believed that the Umayyad caliph al-Walid I built it at the beginning of the 8 th century AD as a palace-city by laborers from Anatolia and Coptic artisans from Egypt.	Lunch at Zahli & Overnight— Beirut—Boutique Hotel
Friday, June 20	Traveling south of Beirut we will visit the Biblical cities of Tyre and Sidon . Tyre was built on an island reportedly impregnable but succumbed to the attack of Alexander the Great who built a causeway to the island. This great Phoenician city explored the seas and founded prosperous colonies such as Cadiz and Carthage. The purple pigment was discovered in Tyre which was reserved for royalty and nobility. King Hiram of Tyre helped build Solomon Temple by sending cedar wood and craftsmen (1 Kings 5:18). Jesus ministered to the Syro-Phoenician woman in the vicinity of Tyre and Sidon (Matthew 15:21-25). Sidon is said to be inhabited since 4,000 BC. During the 13 th century, the Crusaders built Sidon's Sea Castle as a fortress on an island connected to the mainland by a narrow 90-yard long roadway. Eight miles south of Sidon, we will pass by Sarafand (Sarepta/Zarephath), the place where Elijah multiplied the meal and oil and raised the son of the widow of Zarephath (1 Kings 17:8-24).	Lunch at Sidon & Overnight— Beirut—Boutique Hotel
Sabbath, June 21	Today we will attend the Baccalaureate Service at Middle East University and participate in its 75 th Jubilee celebration. If time permits,	Lunch at MEU & Overnight—

	we will visit the National Archaeological Museum in the afternoon. (Program may vary)	Beirut—Boutique Hotel
Sunday, June 22	On our way to Byblos , we will visit Nahr el Kalb inscriptions, described as “history carved in stone.” Assyrian, Babylonian, Egyptian, Roman, and lately British and French armies left their plaques and/or steles commemorating their passage through this impassable barrier. Byblos (Jbeil in Arabic) is a Greek word. Papyrus also received its early Greek name (byblos, byblinos) because it was exported to the Aegean region through Byblos. Hence the Greek words (biblion, plural biblia), gave the Bible its name (the papyrus book). In the afternoon, we will attend the Commencement Service at Middle East University in association with its 75 th Jubilee celebrations. (Program may vary)	Overnight— Beirut—Boutique Hotel
Monday, June 23	Morning flight back to the United States for those who are not going to the Holy Land.

JORDAN (Option 2)		
Thursday, June 19	Our journey begins with an overnight flight from the US to Amman, Jordan.	
Friday, June 20	In the late afternoon—early evening, we will arrive in the Land of the Ammonites and Moabites given to the Tribe of Reuben . The Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan is viewed as an anchor in the often turbulent sea of Middle East politics, due in a large part to the late King Hussein (1953-99). Following pick up at the airport and a 45 minute transfer into the city of Amman for dinner and overnight. Rest awhile for you are about to experience a walk, a story that will change your view of the world, the Bible, and Jesus. Following dinner we will meet for a worship service to celebrate the beginning of the Sabbath.	Dinner & Overnight— Amman Regency Palace
Sabbath, June 21	We will begin our tour with a visit to the Amman Citadel and Archaeological Museum —where the ancient walls of Rabbah still stand as a reminder of King David’s transgression with Bathsheba. Uriah carried his own death sentence to Joab placing him up next to the walls in the heat of the battle. (2 Samuel 11) We will continue on to the site of ancient cities of Jerash and Ajlun . The Decapolis city of Jerash is one of the best examples of a Roman Provincial city that is remarkably well preserved. We also visit the Islamic Castle at Ajlun in the Jabesh-Gilead region (1 Samuel 11). We will stop at the Brook Jabbok where Jacob wrestled all night with the angel Gabriel (Genesis 32:22-32) and visit the region of the Brook Cherith —home of the prophet Elijah (1 Kings 17: 1-6).	Dinner & Overnight— Amman Regency Palace
Sunday, June 22	Tour to the American Center for Oriental Research (ACOR), Tel Umayri, King Abdullah Mosque, and the National Archaeological Museum built at the source of the Jabbok in downtown Amman.	Traditional Palestinian Dinner at a local restaurant. Overnight— Amman Regency Palace
Monday, June 23	Refreshed we begin our day with Matthew 3, the Baptismal site of John the Baptist where he preached and baptized in the Jordan River .

	With the groups from Lebanon and LLUC converging, we visit the Madaba Plains dig site of Heshbon, where a consortium of Andrews University, La Sierra University, and Walla Walla University archeological digs have been going on for over 40 years. Our travels take us to Mount Nebo where Moses had a glimpse of the Promised Land before he died (Deuteronomy 34:1-5). A visit to the Byzantine mosaics of Madaba and St. George's Church reveals an ancient map of early trade routes. We travel the old King's Highway through Edomite territory past the crusader castles of Kerak, the capital city of Moab, to Petra.	Dinner & Overnight— Petra Movenpick (at the park entrance)
Tuesday, June 24	Today will be an unforgettable day spent in the ancient Rose Red City of Petra , one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World, with its magnificent rock-hewn temples and tombs suggesting royalty. We will ride horses, walk through the siq which ends in a breath taking view of the 'Treasury,' climb to the High Altar and up to the Monastery where in the distance you can view Petra's highest peak—Jebel Haroun, the site of Aaron's Tomb. We will stroll through the Nabataean village with its 7000- seat amphitheater, cobblestone streets, and houses tucked into caves along the rose rock walled city.	Dinner & Overnight— Petra Movenpick
Wednesday, June 25	A morning drive south takes us into the Land of Midian , we will 4X4 through Wadi Rum, with its great cinemascope sandy oceans have lunch traditional Bedouin style (an area still inhabited by semi-nomadic Bedouin tribes) and continue on to the port town of Aqaba on the Gulf of Aqaba to board a high-speed ferry to Nuweiba, Egypt.	
EGYPT		
	After disembarking the ferry we travel by bus through the Wilderness of Sinai to the foot of the Mountain. Only the hardest forms of life survive in the Sinai.	Dinner & Overnight— St. Catherine Monastery Guest House
Thursday, June 26	You will have a very early morning inspiring climb up Mount Sinai (reflecting on Moses) or hire a camel, for a specular sunrise and reflection on Exodus 19 & 20. Breakfast/Lunch will follow the descent. We will visit St. Catherine's Monastery, one of the world's oldest continuously functioning monasteries, the place where tradition says that Moses saw the burning bush (Exodus 2-4). One of the monastery's main water sources, known as the Well of Moses and also as the Well of Jethro, is said to be where Moses met his future wife Zipporah (Exodus 2:21) a Cushite (Numbers 12:1). The Monastery houses 2000 icons in its Icon Gallery and a priceless collection of early Christian manuscripts second only to that of the Vatican Library in Rome. Our journey continues through the wilderness of Sinai in contemplation of the journey made by the Children of Israel, to the Egyptian/Israeli border.	Dinner & Overnight— Taba Hilton
ISRAEL		
Friday, June 27	After walking across the border, we will travel through the Philistine Country and see the ancient city gate, the water systems, and the well dug by Abraham at Beersheba — it was here that Abraham made a covenant with Abimelek (Genesis 21). This is also the land given to the Tribe of Simeon. On the way we will visit Timnah to see the foundation remains of a tabernacle much like the Israelite tabernacle. Our walk takes us to visit Tel Maresha by traveling the Gaza Road which Philip rode upon with the Ethiopian eunuch (Acts 8). This site has been recently opened to the public, holding remains from the Hellenistic, Roman, and Byzantine periods. Our travels will also take us to the Bell Caves , site of the ancient quarry used in the production of cement over 2000 years ago.	Dinner & Overnight— Tel Aviv— Dan Panorama Hotel

	Continue on to Tel Aviv .	
Sabbath, June 28	Today, we will continue on to the coastal region of the Great Mediterranean Sea to one of the world's oldest seaports, Jaffa , where Peter stayed with Simon the Tanner (Acts 9:43). As we further our journey up the coastal plain to Caesarea , city of Cornelius the Centurion, the first Gentile to convert to Christianity (Act 10), we will visit the Roman Theatre and view the impressive water aqueduct built by Herod the Great. Mid-morning we leave the coastal plains and the Mediterranean to travel north to Mount Carmel where Elijah held the contest with 450 prophets of Baal (1 Kings 18). For lunch we will stop in the Druze village of Daliat El-Carmel continuing on to the Valley of Jezreel and Megiddo where we will view the excavations of 21 superimposed cities, the remains from Solomon's days (1 Kings 9). Our story continues as we drive through Nazareth where Jesus spent his childhood days in his father's carpenter shop (Matthew 2; Luke 4) and visit the Church of the Annunciation where Mary was visited by the Angel Gabriel (Luke 1:26-28) and told of the forthcoming child. We will also stop at Mount of Precipice (Luke 4) for a view of the Valley of Armageddon. Our walk, our story continues to Cana of Galilee where Jesus performed His first miracle at the wedding feast (John 2:1-11). Today, our walk, our story ends on the shores of the Sea of Galilee reflecting on the disciples whom Jesus called to follow Him.	Dinner & Overnight— on the Sea of Galilee— Tiberias Gia Beach
Sunday, June 29	Luke 9 describes the Transfiguration; today we will travel to the northern most region of Israel, the area given to the Tribe of Dan. We travel through the Hula Valley to Mount Hermon , the Mount of Transfiguration , visiting Hazor and Tel Dan . We will also visit Banias , one of the headwaters of the Jordan River and the site of Caesarea Philippi where Peter confessed Christ's divinity (Luke 9), returning back to the beautiful Sea.	Dinner & Overnight— on the Sea of Galilee— Tiberias Gia Beach
Monday, June 30	Jesus spent much of his public life around the Sea of Galilee ; today we continue our story as we visit a 1 st century fishing boat at Ginnossar. We then experience the sea in a wooden fishing boat, a replica of the fishing boats Jesus' first disciples might have used, as they were masters of the fishing trade. Our walk and our story continue as we proceed across the lake to the Mount of Beatitudes where Christ preached the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7). Jesus and his disciples walked (we will journey by bus) to Capernaum , the home of Simon Peter, and to Tabkha , the site of the feeding of the 5000 (Matthew 14). We will drive around the Sea to Beth Shean (1 Samuel 31), a Decapolis capital, through the region of the Gerasenes (Mark 5). This is the best preserved Roman-Byzantine town in Israel. Beth Shean was on the old trade routes between Mesopotamia and the Mediterranean. On these walls hung the bodies of King Saul and Jonathan. (1 Samuel 31) It was first inhabited during the Canaanite era. We will continue our travels south through the Jordan Valley ending at the Dead Sea , the lowest place on earth (1300 feet below sea level) and see the region of Sodom and Gomorrah and its salt mines. Relax and take a swim in the healing salt water.	Lunch— Traditional St. Peter's Fish by the Sea of Galilee Dinner & Overnight— Dead Sea— Le Meridian Hotel
Tuesday, July 1	We will begin our day at Herod's magnificent fortress on Masada , also the site where the Zealots stood against Rome. After ascending to the top, using the cable car, we will explore the mighty fortress with its well preserved storehouses, cisterns, and palaces. We will travel through the Judean wilderness to Ein Gedi where David wrote some of his beautiful psalms. We will take a short hike to reach the lower waterfall and on to the upper falls for those who want to take the upper trail where David cut off a portion of Saul's robe (1 Samuel 24). Our walk, our story continues north through the region given to the	Dinner & Overnight— Jerusalem— Dan Jerusalem Hotel

	Tribe of Judah, to the home of the ancient Essene Community and Qumran , the site of the discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls in 1947 (one year before Israel was declared a State.) We will end our day with a magnificent view from the Mount of Olives as we overlook the Golden City of Kings David and Solomon. We will have a view of the ancient walled city as well as the modern city in the background, before arriving at our hotel.	
Wednesday, July 2	This morning, our walk, our story will begin with a visit to the Israel Museum and the Shrine of the Book wing where the Dead Sea Scrolls are housed. We also will view the Model of Jerusalem, giving us an overview of the city during the time of Christ and more of a perspective on the modern city. In the afternoon, we will visit Bethlehem , the birthplace of Jesus, and the Church of the Nativity (Luke 2). We end our day at the pastoral Shepherds' Field where David raised his sheep and where the Good News of Jesus' birth was announced to the shepherds.	Dinner & Overnight— Jerusalem— Dan Jerusalem Hotel
Thursday, July 3	The Old City of Jerusalem has a history that stretches back more than 3,000 years, although the present streets date largely from Byzantine times, and the encircling walls from the 16 th century with the exception of the Western Wall. The city is vaguely divided into four quarters: one each for the Christians, Jews, Muslims, and the fourth occupied by the Armenians. East and south of the Old City are the Mount of Olives and Mount Zion, both places traditionally linked with the last acts of Christ. To the north and west is modern Jerusalem. Our walk begins today with a visit to the Temple Mount and the Dome of the Rock (El-Aqsa Mosque), a most holy site to Christians, Jews, and Muslims alike. We will walk to the Pinnacle of the Temple where Jesus was tempted by Satan to cast Himself down (Matthew 4:5-11). We visit Pilate's Judgment Hall , and view the remains of Antonia Fortress , site of Jesus' trial (Matthew 27), and walk through the Cardo and Hezekiah's Wall towards the Arab Market and bazaar. We walk the first century streets viewing the remains of the Temple and the steps used by Jesus when entering it. We will savor the sights, the sounds, the smells of the marketplace and continue on through the old city where we will joyfully express our hearts in song as we sing in St. Anne's Church, and visit the Pool of Bethesda where Christ cured the paralytic man (John 5:1-15). Leaving the Old City through the Lion's Gate, we will walk through the Wadi to the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus and the disciples went following the Last Supper and was arrested (Matthew 26: 17-55).	Dinner & Overnight— Jerusalem— Dan Jerusalem Hotel
Friday, July 4	Today we will spend the entire day in the Old City . We will enter by the Jaffa Gate visiting Jerusalem's Archaeological Park, the Citadel of David, the Upper Room, Caiaphas' House, the Ossuary of Caiaphas . We will walk through the Western Wall tunnel to explore the wall's foundation. Sometime mid-day in our walk along the Via Dolorosa , we will stop at the Baidun Shop (friends of La Sierra University) to have a traditional falafel sandwich while we sit in the courtyard and talk about the shopkeeper's antiquities. We will visit the Church of the Holy Sepulcher —believed to be the site of Golgotha. We will welcome in the Sabbath with the Shabbat celebration at the Western Wall. Our walk, our story ends with these happy celebrations reminding us that the Sabbath is a delight.	Dinner & Overnight— Jerusalem— Dan Jerusalem Hotel
Sabbath, July 5	This morning, our walk, our story takes us to the Valley of Elah where the young lad David challenged the Philistine giant Goliath. (1 Samuel 17). We will have lunch in Ba Harim , the hometown of Elizabeth and Zechariah (Luke 1). Following lunch we will stop at the Damascus Gate and walk past the Albright Institute (used by American archeologists) to the Garden Tomb for worship and	Dinner & Overnight— Jerusalem— Dan Jerusalem

	a communion service in the Garden. As the Sabbath draws to a close, we reflect on what the blood of Jesus, our risen Savior, “He is not here, for He has risen,” has done for each of us.	Hotel
Sunday, July 6	Morning flight back to the US.

ACCOMMODATIONS: All accommodation is in 4 or 5 star hotels (with the exception of St. Catherine’s Monastery at Mt. Sinai). Participants wanting to room by themselves must pay the additional single supplement.

MEALS: Two buffet meals a day are included, and some lunches.

AIRFARE: Airfare is not included. Please indicate on registering if you need help to make flight arrangements.

BAGGAGE: Includes the transportation and handling of two pieces of luggage per person throughout within the limits of airline regulations.

PASSPORTS: A valid U.S. passport is required for U.S. citizens and must be valid 6 months after the return date. Visas are available at the port of entry. For all other nationalities, please consult your country’s consulate.

SIGHTSEEING: Sightseeing tours include services of English-speaking guides and entrance fees to places listed in the itinerary. Land transportation will be provided by best available air-conditioned motor coaches. Horses, 4x4s and a ferry are included in some excursions. Tips to guides and drivers are included.

TOUR PRICE: Price is based on international tariffs and rates in effect on Date of Proposal. Price is based on a minimum number of tour participants using double occupancy. In the event that we do not get a minimum of tour participants, we reserve the right to cancel or re-cost the tour. Late booking or changes may result in an additional fee.

THE TOUR COSTS DO NOT INCLUDE: Cost of personal/trip cancellation and baggage insurance, transportation of excess baggage, immunizations, passports, health insurance, personal trip insurance, all items of a personal nature such as laundry, extra gratuities, optional excursions or deviations from the scheduled tour, individual transfers to join or leave the group once the tour has commenced, meals not shown as included, menu items not on the table, beverages, and any item not specifically mentioned as included.
