You will be transferred from Kilimanjaro International Airport to hotel

Day 03: Sun Aug 28: Arusha, Tanzania—Ngorongoro

Following breakfast your guide will pick you up for an approximate 3 hour Safari drive across the plains to the spectacular Ngorongoro Crater to explore one of the most recognized wildlife conservation areas in Tanzania today. The Ngorongoro Crater is the world’s largest inactive, intact, and unfilled volcanic caldera. This geological masterpiece was formed as a result of an extremely large volcanic explosion which caused the volcano to collapse in and on itself, thus creating a crater. The crater is roughly 20 kilometers wide and some 2000 feet deep making the trip from crater floor to rim around 45 minutes by 4X4 vehicles. No private vehicles are allowed into the crater without the 4X4 capability. The extremely fertile crater floor is the reason why there is such a high concentration of wildlife. Over 20,000 mammals call the crater home, including some of the only remaining black rhinos in the world. The crater floor also boasts one of the highest carnivore densities in the world including large prides of lions, packs of hyenas and solitary predators like cheetahs and jackals. The keen eye and expertly

recommended search patterns from your safari guide will help you spot some of the less common species like leopards, servals, and bat-eared foxes.

Dinner and Overnight: Serena Safari Lodge Ngorongoro

Day 04: Mon Aug 29: Ngorongoro—Olduvai Gorge—Serengeti

Following breakfast your guide will continue with your drive from the Ngorongoro Conservation area to the famous plains of the Serengeti. On the way you will stop at the Olduvai Gorge. The massive Olduvai Gorge or Oldupai Gorge is often referred to as “The Cradle of Mankind.” Beginning in the eastern Serengeti plains, the gorge is roughly some 48 kilometers long resulting from centuries of natural erosion. This gorge boasts a steep-sided ravine that cuts and stretches its way through the Great Rift Valley along eastern Africa. The gorge was named after a commonly used plant by the Masai people. Its scientific name is Sansevieria-Ehrenbergil, or Oldupai for short.

In the afternoon you will continue with your safari guide in search of game in the never-ending expanses of the Serengeti. The Serengeti is home to the “Big 5” and touts the largest population of lions and giraffes in all of Africa. Heavy populations of topi, gazelle, waterbuck, and hartebeests provide an ample food source for local carnivores including cheetah, hyenas, and the African wild dog. The region is also home to 500+ species of birds ranging in size from ostrich, crowned crane, marabou stork, secretary birds to numerous smaller species that are more difficult to photograph.

Dinner and Overnight: Mbugani Camp

Day 05: Tue Aug 30: Serengeti

Following breakfast, this morning’s African adventure begins with an exploratory game drive, and following lunch we will have an afternoon game drive in search for the Impalas one of Africa’s most beautiful and graceful animals. The Impala can jump distances more than 10 meters (33 ft.) and 3 meters (9 ft.) high. Leopards, cheetah, lions and wild dogs prey on the impala. They can reach running speeds of approximately 80-90 km/hr (50-55 mph) to escape their predators.

Dinner and Overnight: Mbugani Camp

Day 06: Wed Aug 31: Serengeti—Nairobi

Following breakfast, if time allows your expert guides will squeeze in one more game drive before dropping you off at the airstrip to take the flight from Serengeti to Nairobi. The flight duration is approximately 4 hours and travels via Kilimanjaro and/or Arusha to clear customs for the flight to Nairobi. (flights included in price)

Following immigration and customs in Nairobi, a representative will pick you up and transfer you to the hotel to meet the arriving group from the US.

Day 01: Tue, Aug 30: International Flights from US to Nairobi Kenya

Day 02: Wed, Aug 31 Arrival at Jomo Kenyatta International Airport Nairobi approximately 2100 hours (9pm). Upon arrival and customs clearance, you will be transferred to your hotel for overnight.

Overnight: Crowne Plaza Nairobi

Day 03: Thu, Sep 01—Nairobi

Following breakfast you will enjoy a visit to the Giraffe Centre where you can hand-feed the giraffes. The Giraffe Centre was established to preserve the dwindling population of Rothschild Giraffes in Kenya. Today there are about 300 of them on game reserves such as Soy Sambu Ranch near lake Elementaita, Kigio Conservancy near Gilgil and Sergoit Ranch in Eldoret. The new giraffes, when old enough, are relocated to the different reserves in Kenya.

You will stop at the Karen Blixen house, once lived in by Karen, and made world familiar as the movie set for “Out of Africa” with Meryl Streep and Robert Redford. (Try to see the movie again). Ms. Blixen’s good works, among and for the local people, have made her into a legend. If you are interested in the local jewelry you can visit the Kazuri Bead Factory, it’s an all-woman craft workshop that is renowned for making fabulous clay beads and jewelry.

You will stop at Karen Blixen Coffee Garden Restaurant for lunch. The site of the original farmhouse built in 1906. The property now serves as a beautiful location to enjoy a meal surrounded by large hundred year old trees and beautiful gardens.

Following lunch there will be an optional tour available of the East Africa Division office, East Africa University, and Maxwell School.

This evening you can arrange a private visit with your sponsored animal at the David Sheldrick Wildlife Trust. This private visit is only arranged for those who foster an animal. Private visits occur at 5pm. To foster an animal visit: <https://www.sheldrickwildlifetrust.org/asp/fostering.asp>

Founded in 1977 by Dr Dame Daphne Sheldrick D.B.E, in honor of the memory of her late husband, a famous naturalist and founding Warden of Tsavo East National Park, David Leslie William Sheldrick MBE.

Day 4: Fri, Sep 02: Nairobi—Laikipia

Following breakfast we will meet our safari guides (6-7) to a vehicle. The drive is approximately three hours from the urban centre of Nairobi, through the fertile highlands, and the semi-arid frontier of Kenya. It is simply breath-taking and a great way to see the countryside.

You will visit the Ol Pejeta Conservancy and the Sweetwaters Chimpanzee Sanctuary. The sanctuary is the only place in Kenya where this highly endangered and remarkable intelligent species can be seen.

The Chimpanzees live in two large groups separated by the Ewaso Nyiro River. The Laikipia District is located on the Equator in the central region of the country.

Dinner and Overnight: Sweetwaters Serena

Day 5: Sat Sep 03: Laikipia—Nakuru

Following breakfast your safari guides will take you on an excursion through the beautiful rift valley to Nakuru, approximately 4 hours. There are 56 different mammal species, the endangered Rothschild Giraffe and leopard, as well as Black and White rhino in the region. One of the most notable of the Rift Valley soda lakes is Lake Nakuru. This lake was renowned for its abundance of algae, which would attract the vast quantity of flamingos lining the shore. In 2013, the lake received an alarming increase in water levels, leading to the migration of large portions of the flamingos flocks to nearby Lake Bogoria.

Dinner and Overnight: Lake Nakuru Sopa Lodge

Day 6: Sun Sep 04: Nakuru—Masai Mari

Following breakfast, you will join your safari guides and travel on to one of Kenya's most notable game reserves, Masai Mara. This drive takes approximately 5-6 hours. Along the way you will stop for refreshments and souvenir shopping. Upon arrival at the game reserve you will enjoy some afternoon game viewing. The Masai Mara boasts a high population of the African "Big 5", which includes the African Elephant, Cape Buffalo, Rhinoceros, Leopard, and the King of the Beasts, the Lion. You will be accompanied by an experienced tracker-guide on an exciting game viewing adventure.

Dinner and Overnight: Sopa Lodge, Masai Mari

Day 7: Mon Sep 05: Masai Mara

Just like the local wildlife, you will head out bright and early this morning alongside an experienced tracker-guide for the day's first game drive. The eco-diversity and sheer size of the Masai Mara Game Reserve provides the necessary requirements to house a wide range of animal species including the "Big 5" and numerous other bird and wildlife that inhabit this dynamic location such as Hyenas, Gazelles, Impalas, Giraffes, Zebras, Vultures, Cranes, Eagles, Falcons, and Ostriches.

Following lunch, on the afternoon game drive, the choice is up to you: search for the "Big 5" or expand your horizons to discover something different that the Mara has to offer.

Dinner and Overnight: Sopa Lodge, Masai Mari

Day 8: Tue Sep 06: Masai Mara

This morning you will again set out bright and early on a "migration" inspired game drive with your experienced guide. Our journey today will take you into the thick of the Masai Mara plains, in search of some of the many grazing species that take part in the annual migration yearly, an event that has been going on for centuries. Exceptional populations of Zebras, Gazelles, Impalas, and of course Wildebeests thunderously feed and migrate from the Serengeti and through the Mara area every year from July to October.

Following lunch, you will again set out with your guide for another exciting adventure. The Mara area is one of the few places left in Africa where one can still spot Rhinos in the wild. Your guide will take you to locations where Rhinos have been recently reported. Have your camera ready to snap a photo of one of these elusive lumbering giants.

Dinner and Overnight: Sopa Lodge, Masai Mara

Day 9: Wed Sep 07: Masai Mara—Nairobi—Zanzibar

Following breakfast, your safari guide drivers will drive you from Masai Mara with short stops for refreshments on the 6 hour drive back to Nairobi for your flight to Zanzibar. (Internal flights priced separately). Flight is approximately 1 hr and 40 min.

Upon arrival in Zanzibar you will clear customs and be transferred to your hotel in the heart of Zanzibar's historic Stone Town which is one of UNESCO World Heritage Sites. The Old Fort and Forodhani Gardens are only a five minute walk from your hotel.

Dinner and Overnight: Serena Inn, Stone Town Zanzibar

Day 10: Thu Sep 08: Zanzibar

Day at leisure— Zanzibar is also known for its spice trade. Optional tours are available that include Swahili Cultural tours, Spice tours, Stone Town Tours, and Slave Market cultural experiences as well as beach activities.

Control of Zanzibar eventually came into the hands of the British Empire; part of the political impetus for this was the 19th century movement for the abolition of the slave trade. Zanzibar was the center of the Arab slave trade, and 1822, the British counsel in Muscat put pressure on Sultan Said to end the slave trade. The first of a series of anti-slavery treaties with Britain was signed by Said which prohibited slave transport south and east of the Moresby Line, from Cape Delgado in Africa to Diu Head on the coast of India. Said lost the revenue he would have received as duty on all slaves sold, so to make up for this shortfall he encouraged the development of the slave trade in Zanzibar itself. Said came under increasing pressure from the British to abolish slavery, and in 1842 the British government told the Zanzibari ruler it wished to abolish the slave trade to Arabia, Oman, Persia and the Red Sea. Ships from the Royal Navy were employed to enforce the anti-slavery treaties by capturing any dhows carrying slaves, but with only four ships patrolling a huge area of sea, the British navy found it hard to enforce the treaties as ships from France, Germany, Spain, Portugal and the United States continued to carry slaves. In 1856 Sultan Majid consolidated his power around the East African slave trade, and in 1873 Sir John Kirk informed his successor, Sultan Barghash, that a total blockade of Zanzibar was imminent, and Barghash reluctantly signed the Anglo-Zanzibari treaty which abolished the slave trade in the sultan's territories, the closing of all slave markets and the protection of liberated slaves.

Dinner and overnight: Serena Inn, Stone Town, Zanzibar

Day 11: Fri Sep 09: Zanzibar—Nairobi—Victoria Falls--Livingstone

Following breakfast you will transfer to the airport for your flight back to Nairobi. Departure Tax USD \$49 included. You will enjoy an approximately 1 hr and 40 min scenic flight from the Tanzanian Island of Zanzibar to the Kenyan urban hub, Nairobi to connect to a flight to Livingstone, Zambia. Flight time is approximately 3 hrs. (internal flights priced separately)

Upon arrival we will be met and transferred to our hotel.

Dinner: Boma Cultural Dinner

Following check in at the hotel, you will head out to the Boma for dinner. Tucked into a Gusu Forest and partly open to the warm night skies, this is not just another ethnic restaurant, but a rather unique cultural experience. Upon arrival you will receive a warm welcome with a traditional greeting in Shona and Ndebele, the local languages. You will be invited to a hand washing ceremony before sampling

some traditional snacks and a drink as a prelude to dinner. There will be a variety of traditional Zimbabwean dishes accompanied by entertainment throughout your meal. You can get involved in some interactive drumming and dancing, or simply watch from the side line.

Overnight: The Kingdom at Victoria Falls

Day 12: Sat Sep 10: Victoria Falls

Following breakfast, you will experience Victoria Falls up close. It is truly an awe-inspiring experience—the sight, the sound, the smell; a humbling feeling that here indeed is Nature’s Supreme Masterpiece. Victoria Falls is listed as one of the Seven Natural Wonders of the World. The Falls reaches its zenith in about May each year. Your tour will take you past the “Big Tree” where you can stop and take photos. You will be guided through the Rainforest and learn a brief history of the Falls, the flora, fauna, bird and wildlife as well as, points of interest along the way. Raincoats will be provided when needed.

You will experience the true flavours of Victoria Falls with a “home lunch”. A short transfer will take you to the Chinotimba High Density Suburb where guests are hosted by a local family in their residence and served a traditional African homemade lunch.

This evening you will be transferred to the jetty, where you will board the newest, sleekest and largest cruise boat operating on the Zimbabwe side of the Zambezi River, the Zambezi Explorer. The boats on board facilities run exclusively on solar energy. From here you will cruise along towards Palm Island and Kandahar Island to enjoy a picturesque African sunset on the Zambezi River. Relax and enjoy the beauty of the river with the opportunity to see a variety of game, including hippo, crocodile, elephant, and many different bird species. Your cruise includes snacks and soft drinks and many beautiful photo opportunities. Your reservations are on the signature deck with its comfortable lounge chairs and sofas.

Overnight: The Kingdom at Victoria Falls

(B, L, cruise snacks)

Day 13: Sun Sep 11: Victoria Falls—Bulawayo, Zimbabwe

Following breakfast, you will travel to Bulawayo. On the way you will pass by towns and villages and see what daily life is like for most Zimbabweans. Due to slow highway speed limits this drive will take approximately 9 hours including stops along the way for refreshments as needed.

Overnight: Nesbitt Castle, Bulawayo

Day 14: Mon Sep 12: Bulawayo, Zimbabwe

Following breakfast you will travel with your guide to visit the **Great Zimbabwe Ruins** near Masvingo. You will tour the ruins and return to Bulawayo to overnight.

Great Zimbabwe is a ruined city in the south eastern hills of Zimbabwe near Lake Mutirikwe and the town of Masvingo. It was the capital of the Kingdom of Zimbabwe during the country’s Late Iron Age. Construction on the monument by ancestors of the Shona people began in the 11 century and continued until the 15th century, spanning an area of 722 hectares (1,780 acres), which at its peak could have housed up to 18,000 people. Great Zimbabwe served as a royal palace for the Zimbabwean monarch and would have been used as the seat of political power. One of its most prominent features were the walls, some of which were over five metres high and were constructed without mortar. Eventually the city was abandoned and fell into ruin. It is recognized as a **World Heritage Site** by UNESCO.

Overnight: Nesbitt Castle, Bulawayo

Day 15: Tue Sep 13: Bulawayo—Johannesburg, South Africa—Swaziland

Following breakfast, for those who are interested, you will visit Solusi University, the oldest Seventh-day Adventist University on the African Continent. Founded in 1894, Solusi University aspires to provide facilities, mentorship and training that sparks the student's intellect, physique, social advancement, and above all, spiritual maturity.

Mid-day you will transfer to the Bulawayo airport for approximately a 1 ½ hour flight to Johannesburg. (internal flights priced separately)

Upon arrival at Tambo International Airport, Johannesburg, South Africa you will clear immigration and customs and transfer to our awaiting vehicle and proceed to Swaziland.

The Kingdom of Swaziland, a former British Protection Territory, now ruled by King Mswati III, is an interactive cultural experience introducing us to the charming people of Swaziland and their traditions. We continue through the capital city Mbabane, and onto the beautiful Ezulwini Valley.

Day 16: Wed Sep 14: Swaziland

Following breakfast at the Hotel you will have a full day to interact and enjoy " Saving Orphans through Healthcare and Outreach" projects with Cynthia Prime.

In Sub-Saharan Africa a child is orphaned every 14 seconds. In the wake of the HIV/AIDS pandemic, there are over 15,000,000 orphans living there.

In the small Southern African kingdom of Swaziland, HIV/AIDS infects more than one in four people, making it the country with the highest HIV/AIDS prevalence rate in the world. The result is an exploding number of households headed by children, some as young as eight or nine years old.

Day 17: Thu Sep 15: Swaziland

Day at leisure with SOHO—You will spend time at the orphan Care Points interacting with the children, experience Swazi life and culture through oral history, music, and traditional dances at the Cultural Village.

Day 18: Fri Sep 16: Swaziland—Johannesburg—Cape Town

Following breakfast you will transfer from Swaziland to Johannesburg Airport for your 2 hour flight to Cape Town International Airport where you will be met by your representative and transferred to your hotel.

Buffet Dinner: Yizani Restaurant is inspired by everything local and is authentically South African. Yizani translates as “Come in... Welcome” in Xhosa, and is perfectly appropriate in that this restaurant offers a world class welcome that sets the scene for the experience to follow.

Overnight: Southern Sun Waterfront Cape Town

Day 19: Sat Sep 17: Cape Town

Following breakfast you will embark on a full day tour of the Cape Peninsula. You will take in the beaches of Clifton and Camps Bay, before crossing over to Hout Bay, where you may choose an optional boat cruise to Seal Island. From here you will continue on to the Cape of Good Hope Nature Reserve via Chapman's Peak, one of the world's most breath taking coastal drives. You will board a funicular to the top of the Peninsula to witness the symbolic meeting of the Indian and Atlantic Oceans as well as have spectacular views over False Bay. You will enjoy a lunch in the area before continuing to Simonstown, the naval base, and a visit to the African Penguin breeding colony at Boulders Beach. En route back to our hotel, you will stop at the world renowned Kirstenbosch Gardens.

Overnight: Southern Sun Waterfront Cape Town

Day 20: Sun Sep 18: Cape Town

This morning following breakfast you will board a ferry to Robben Island where a local guide (someone who spent time on the island during the Apartheid years) will give you a personal and often moving account of time spent there. You will learn about Nelson Mandela, the island's most famous prisoner; see his cell where he spent nearly 27 years of his life and get a sense of what Mandela experienced.

Following lunch you will continue your exploration of Cape Town, known affectionately as the Mother City. You will see the Houses of Parliament, the Castle (built between 1666 and 1679, this is South Africa's oldest building), lively Greenmarket Square with its daily market, the Company Gardens, and Table Mountain. **The cable car fee is not included as it is weather dependent.** Weather permitting, the spectacular view over the city and Peninsula is worth the ride. On the descent, you will stop at Bo Kaap, home of the Cape Malay community, with its cobbled streets and brightly coloured houses.

This evening discover GOLD in Cape Town. From the moment that you walk through the glass doors into the aged brick interior, with its ancient doors, wooden beams and iron pillars, you will feel the heartbeat of a unique African restaurant in Cape Town. GOLD Restaurant will take you on a taste safari from Cape Malay to African cuisine from Cape Town to Timbuktu with its set 14 course menu served at your table. You will begin the evening with an interactive Djembe drumming session which will get you in tune with African rhythms and songs that will inspire you for the rest of the evening. A soothing hand washing ceremony will complete your interactive drumming experience. Your tables will be surrounded by unique African décor. Each dish served will represent a different country in Africa. During your dining experience, you will be captivated by the tall graceful Mali Puppets as they dance around your tables with drummers and singers.

Overnight: Southern Sun Waterfront Cape Town

Day 21: Mon Sep 19: Cape Town—US

Following breakfast there is an optional tour to visit Helderberg College, the flagship educational institution founded in 1893 with the establishment of Claremont Union College, Cape Town. The College changed locations in 1919 and again in 1928 in an attempt to follow more closely the philosophy that has motivated this institution. After the first move the college became known as Spion Kop College, and in 1928 the last move established Helderberg College on the slopes of Helderberg Mountain, Somerset West, South Africa. The original stately double-storey college building has since been proclaimed a national monument and is today the focal building in a modern shopping complex.

Early afternoon transfer to Cape Town international airport for flights back to the US.

Travel Tips by Country

KENYA

- **Passport/Visa:** A passport valid for at least six months and visa are required for both Canadian and US citizens. Visa may be obtained upon arrival at the airport. Single entry visa is \$50 per person, payable in cash, new bills (no credit cards)
- **Health Insurance:** Health insurance is essential. You will be covered by East African Flying Doctors Services while on the tour.
